1.1 INTRODUCTION

Mrs. Kesharbai Sonajirao Kshirsagar Alias kaku Arts, Science & Commerce College Beed.(M.S.) run by Navgan Shikshan Sanstha Rajuri (N) was established in June 1971 by Honorable Late Kesharbai Sonajirao Kshirsagar Alias Kaku (Ex. Member of Parliament) with a noble & foresighted vision to provide higher education to rural youth. The students of this region from poor & backward families should get quality higher education was the intension behind establishment of this institution. The college is now a fully fledged Multi-Faculty institution with sufficient strength of students. The college runs Under Graduate programmes Bachelor of Arts with thirteen subjects, Bachelor of Science with seven subjects andBachelor of Commerce in all subjects. The college runs P.G.courses in twelvesubjects; along with these courses college also runs five skill oriented courses. College having well qualified teaching staff.

College is reaccredited by NAAC with 'A' Grade in Nov.2011 (CGPA 3.11). Also college is certified by ISO 9001-2015. Green audit Campus audited by private agency.

The College provides facilities like gym, sports, canteen, consumer store, well furnished teaching halls, well equipped laboratories, well equipped huge indoor games Auditorium, health care centre, girl'shostel, language laboratory for effective communication.

Library has plenty of books, research journals, magazines, e-library, reference books section, facility having esources. Separate reading rooms for girls & boys are made available.

Departments of Home science, Microbiology, Zoology, Hindi are recognized research centers for research students. More than eighteen research guides in various subjects are doing effective research work in various fields.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Mrs. K.S.K. College of Arts, Science and Commerce is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad both U.G. and P.G. level courses are offered to the students. Department of drama runs one diploma, one certificate course as per the permission of the university. The college offers certificate courses offered by the Life Long Learning and Extension Department of Dr.B.A.M.U.Aurangabad, in Home Science, English and library management. During the last 5 years various courses are offered at college level namely Sugam Sangeet, Tally, Food preservation, Crop management, Sericulture, Human rights, Disaster management, Agricultural Microbiology. The library has e-library facility, e-books and e-journals are available. Semester system is followed at U.G. level and from the academic year 2015-16 C.B.C. grading system has been introduced in all P.G. programmes. Record of teaching activity is monitored by the principal and a separate P.G. Director is appointed for observing and monitoring of P.G. teaching. Our staff members are appointed on various academic bodies, Board of studies and academic council for the smooth functioning of syllabus framing and other academic activities. Regular feedback is taken from the students on curriculum. Parents, alumni feedback is also taken which helps in making necessary developments and changes. Sufficient ICT halls and LCD projectors are available for modern teaching. A separate well equipped indoor games auditorium is available for the students to play Badminton, Table tennis etc. The college tries its best for the overall development of the students.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Institute has good average of percentage of enrollment of student as per intake capacity. In last five years institution enrolled 52.72% seats from various reserved categories. The institution assesses the learning levels

of the students through remedial classes, test tutorials, group discussion etc. In the institution 43 full time permanent, 3 full time temporary and 37 part time faculties are working. All faculties use student centric method and ICT resources in teaching learning process. Many teachers received awards. The institution follows transparent evaluation process. We reforms CIE system at the institutional level. Programme out comes and course outcomes for all programme are strictly followed in the institution. Twenty one differently disabled students are admitted during last five years. All faculties followed the academic calendar for the conduct of continuous internal evaluation. Average passing percentage of outgoing students is 62.39% during last five years.

For student satisfactions survey regarding teaching learning process, we mentioned the name of the student, gender student ID number, email ID, Adhar number, cell number of all currently enrolled students. The list of all students is uploaded on the website.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institute makes efforts to promote research culture. To provide research Climate College has formulated research committee. IQAC has started Multidisciplinary National Research Journal 'KESONA REPORT' having ISSN No. 2456 -2025 and 'Kesona Publication'. According to copy right act and as per UGC guidelines authors has to sign "Copy Right Agreements" before publishing articles in this journal. Department of Zoology, Microbiology, Home science and Hindi are recognized as 'Research Centers' by Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University Aurangabad. Sixty research students are working under the guidance of eighteen research guides in different subjects and in last five year twenty sevens students have been awarded Ph.D. degree. Many faculty members have undertaken research projects useful for society and they are publishing outcome of research in conference proceeding and in reputed research journals. The institute gives motivation to teachers who received awards. The institute conducts workshops and seminars on important topics of different subjects.

Many departments of institution make collaborative endeavor impact full by signing MoU with other institutions and organizations. Under this functional MoU exchange of research facilities, publication of research papers, organization of seminars and other activities are carried out. Various departments of institution have created linkages with other institution and organizations under this student and staff visited various reputed places like IISSER, IUCAA, industries, and departments of other colleges to get innovative ideas of research.

Institution conducted various outreach programs in collaboration with community, nongovernment and government agencies through NSS, NCC, Lifelong learning and extension departments.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Our institute has adequate infrastructure to support its curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular requirements. The management of the institute has constantly been striving for enhancing the physical infrastructure and learning resources.

Every year budget allocation is made for providing additional requirements of laboratories, extension of building and other infrastructure as per the requisition obtained from the teaching departments and others. This is made in consultation with HODs and Principal.

There are adequate lecture halls and laboratories for UG and PG courses. The class rooms are spacious and well furnished. Library has more than 91000 books, journals, periodicals, news papers-resources etc. For recreation of the students, facility to play Badminton, Volleyball, Archery, Caroms, Chess etc. are provided by sports department. Play ground is available for out-door games. Newly introduced indoor games auditorium with gym is available with advanced equipment for student and staff in our college. The common seminar hall is used for extracurricular activities, NSS, personality development programmes, workshops and seminars. Canteen facility, consumer store, Wi-Fi facility, RO drinking water facility is available for students.

The institute has a well developed maintenance system which takes care of maintenance and update of the infrastructure facilities and equipments. The institute has arranged the outsourcing labor time-to-time for update and maintenance of premises etc.

Student Support and Progression

The Institute continuously deals with inspiring students to participate actively in the various curricular and extracurricular activities and programmes for their overall development and progression.

SC, ST, OBC Cell identifies and guides students to apply for various Central & State government Scholarships. Institute also offers motivational Awards /Scholarships.

Various capability enhancement and development schemes are planned and implemented. Vocational Education training is conducted with help of university & various departments. Student support system like student grievance cell, anti-ragging and prevention of sexual harassment committee are punctual to redress grievances as early as possible.

During last five years due to institutional facilities average Percentage of student progression to higher education, placement and success in competitive examination is improving.

Students participate actively in various types of activities conducted by dramatics, music and sports department. Various departments and committees organize competitions. About 40-45 numbers of activities are conducted per year during last five years receiving noticeable number of awards and participation awards.

As per the direction of Dr. B. A. M. U. Aurangabad, according to Merit basis, active Student council is constituted. Sports, NCC; NSS and Cultural representatives are nominated. Students are also members of Anti-ragging, annual College Magazine and IQAC.

Registration procedure of Alumni Association was completed in 2017. Meeting of Association is held once in a year. Five solar lamps and other needy furniture are donated by alumni. The willing alumni honor prizes to merit students. Alumni Association constituting thirteen alumni has been formulated.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Late Mrs. Kesharbai Sonajirao Kshirsagar establised Mrs. K.S.K. College Beed (1971) keeping in mind the view of upliftment of the poor and rural society people through mission and goals of the institute.

College has local Governing Council Consisting of six members of which principal is the member secretary. At

college level, two – vice principals assist the Principal and coordinator of IQAC, office superintendent, Supervisor, and P.G. Director monitor the academic and administrative activities. All the Heads of the department and Chairman of different committees further assist the Principal.

The quality policy of the institution pronounces that the college is committed to pursue high standards of excellence in all our endeavors by focusing on teaching- learning, research, extension, administration, management, sports, games and cultural activities while promoting a culture of research students all round development and commitment to quality, excellence and adequate services to students. Especially those hailing from rural areas.

The college provides welfare measure for teaching and non teaching staff as per their needs for financial and academic facilities. Staff credit society provides loan facility on emergency and regular basis, vehicle for handicapped staff, computer training for teaching and non-teaching staff, participation in orientation and refresher course, promotion under CAS, duty leave for attending conference, seminar, workshop, symposium and training program. College provides canteen facility for teaching and nonteaching staff, felicitation of staff those who are appointed in various bodies and awards, and college provides Wi-Fi facility to all the stakeholders.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution has organized many gender equity promotion programmes. College has also provided the facilities in terms of safety and security, counseling. Green audit is made by external agency in which the efforts are taken to run environment friendly green practices like energy conservation, rain water harvesting, solid, and liquid and e-waste management, plastic free campus, paperless office etc. No vehicles are allowed in the campus on every second and fourth Saturday of the month. The college has provided the physical facilities, ramp facility, and special rest room for the differently disabled students and staff. Every year college has addressed location advantages and disadvantages to the students through many programs on and off the campus. The college has own code of conduct for student, teacher, governing body, principal and non-teaching staff. Since most of the students of our college are from rural area and because of the lack of awareness, they were lagging behind in fluent communication. As a remedial measure, English language lab was introduced in 2013 with an intension to make students comfortable and commendable while communication. Eventually this practice is proven to be one of the best practices of the college. Another best practice of our college is student's Mentoring system. Cultural activities undertaken by the college has created the likings for art among the students as a result of which many students of our college are performing their art in dramas and music at the national level.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The institute provides a number of mechanisms for slow learners and advanced learners after admission process.

For slow learners :

Institution organizes regular interaction between students and faculties. It is a heart breaking experience for the student to be in a class day after day but fail to keep with what the teacher is teaching, especially, not because they haven't been making an effort to cope, but simply because their mind works that way. The institution organizes following special programmes.

- 1. Test and tutorials: Each department organizes test and tutorials to assess the learning levels of the students. After conducting test, slow lectures are sorted out.
- 2. Group discussions: Each department organizes group discussions among slow learners and advanced learners. Teacher invites slow learners to come forward during teaching in class.

Remedial teaching:

Remedial teaching identifies slow learners and given them the necessary guidance to help them overcome their problems, after identifying their areas of difficulty.

Remedial measures:

Learning takes place from simple to complex. For some reason the student have not learnt the basics, it is futile to teach him the advanced topics. Remedial teaching is not revising the topics taught repeatedly

but it carefully analysis of the student's performance in the tests and diagnosing the areas of diffculty.All are key aspects in remedial teaching.

Once, the difficult areas are identified the next task is to plan the learning experience as to teach the basics to understand the give topic.

Teachers often feel that what has not been learnt at the primary level, cannot be trusted simultaneously with the prescribed topics at the secondary level.Experience shows that once the basics are taught, the learning process is assessed and the slow learners comprehend and grasp the given topics of the class since they have already attained the mental age.

Deptartment runs short term certificate courses, guest lectures, personal counseling to cater the emotional, academic and behavioral problem of the lecturers.

For Advanced learners:-

The institution provides additional learning material such as books & reviews. Each department inspires students to participate in quiz competition, debate competition, problem solving and other decision making exercise. Institution also provides CDS and various web-based material. Researches inspired to extensive participation in project work based on theoretical data, practical work & survey data. Advanced learners are motivated and encouraged to participate in various inter college, inter- university, Avishkar and national level programmes.

Faculty conduct lectures by using K-YAN. Each department organizes student seminars on various topics. Department of English provides advanced software for teaching & learning english. Institution inspires student to participate in science exhibition for creative science learning.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

We do follow the assessment procedure as per the norms of Dr.B.A.M. University, Aurangabad .We conduct one test in each semester of 20 marks as a part of continuous internal evaluation. The assignment and class tests for quick learners and slow learners.

Class seminars technical paper presentation and mini- projects are introduced in the curriculum to make the environment activity based. Till today no special approach is followed for measurement of impact of the above practices. However the effect is seen as follows.

- Improved student understanding in do main knowledge and over all development of students.
- Improved results and pass percentage.
- reduced backlogs and detention.
- Improved quality of projects.
- Improved placement.

Strategies adopted for student improvement.

Remedial classes are organized to clarify doubts. re-explaining of various topics for improving performances. Poor performance due to frequent irregularity is dealt by sending message to parents through mentor. Appropriate counselling with additional teaching, eventually helps students to attend classes regularly. All the staff members maintain good relation with students and deal with their problems in a gentle manner. Each class is divided into two batches and separate tutorial classes are conducted to all students for all branches & under graduate courses. Generally, one teacher is assigned for each batch.

The methodologies used for continuous internal Evaluation (CIE) are group discussion, assignments, seminar presentation, individual project work, class test papers and two internal examination.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

As per the rules and regulation of Dr.B.A.M.University, Aurangabad

teachers explain the students the evalution methods such as question paper pattern, practical examination pattern and scheme of marking..

Internal assement in college is transparent that every student has an idea about the standard internal evaluation process of the theory and practical subject.

Each department displays marks of students on notice board. marks obtained in all the PSO's and CO's are grouped and is considered as 50% of total marks. For internal examination slow learners are permitted to improves their marks by repeating the experiment if they have scored low. All such modifications are displayed in the department notice board for student reference. The institute follows the rules and regulations of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad [Maharashtra]. The college prospers an Academic calendar according to the university rules and regulation.

In the first week after the start of a new semester, Head of the departments tells about the information about the labs and subjects of the semester to the students. Institute organize parents meet as well as student meet to make them acquainted with the rules and regulations of the affiliating university, examinations, evaluation process, extra- curricular activities.

There is transparency in evaluation .The student can get a photocopy of the assessed answer book after the declaration of the result. This can be done by paying the prescribed fee and the students can apply for revaluation for their answer scripts of semester and examinations. Teachers motivate the students to understand that they are learning not for the sake of acquiring in depth and breath of knowledge. So that they accept the policy of life-long learning.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

Examination related grievances are handled by the student mentor to make it time bound and transparent. Semester examination answer scripts are distributed to the students as regard to total checking and for clarification if any. The marks awarded for the semester examinations which constitute the internal assessment component are displayed on the examination section notice board.

The examination section displays the evaluation report by cross checking the statement of marks on submitted by the respective faculty member of the department.

- Student approaches his mentor for the clarifications related to internal marks of tests & other if any.
- Student issue related to the above will be perceived by the mentor in a time bound of 7 days.
- Student mentor cross checks the same issue with the department and exam section.
- Recommendations are forwarded to the department internal committee.
- A Clear report of the issue will be given to the examination section through department.
- The entire process is monitored by the chief supritendent and then the final details are forwarded to Dr. B.A.M.U. University Aurangabad.

• The all issues regarding examinations were identified and sorted out for furter action.

Grievances related to the University external examinations is addressed by the Chief Superidentent CDC cell, examination Department of Dr. B.A.M.U. University Aurangabad.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

Response:

The committee consist principal which prepare the academic calendar well in advance according to the rules and regulation of department of Examination Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathawad University, Aurangabad before the commencement of the semester. The calendar outlines the semester class work. Schedule, internal examination schedule and external examination schedule.

The faculty members of the concerned department collectes the syllabus for semester examination. The head of the department finalizes the course allocation for the faculty members based on their choice and area of interest or expertise. The faculty members prepares the lesson plan before the commencement of semester, indicating the topics to be covered lecture wise including the evaluation process for each subject and it is duly reviewed one of the senior faculty in the department and approved by the head of the department. It is then, made available to the students. Time table is prepared as per the guidelines of respective statutory bodies for the number of credit hours for each subject to the commencement of the students is assessed on a continuous basis by conducting two test examinations as per the norms and regulations of Dr.B.A.M.University, Aurangabad. In addition to the tests and tutorials assignments, project and quiz are also the part of continuous Internal Evaluation. The evaluated answer books are returned to the students and an opportunity is given to the students to discuss the evaluation with the teacher, the teacher rectifies any error, if any .Finally the Internal assessment is carried out for 30 marks.

Continuous internal evaluation is useful in ensuring the achievement of learning outcomes of our students. the methodologies used for this prepare are group discussion, assignment seminar presentation individual or group project work.

2.6.2 Attainment of program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution

Response:

Method of assessment of Pos / PSOs

The program outcomes and program Specific outcomes are assessed with the help of course outcomes of the relevant courses through direct and indirect methods.

Direct methods are provided through direct examinations or observations of student knowledge or skills against measurable course outcomes.

The Knowledge and skills described by the course outcomes are mapped to specific problems on University Examination, internal exams and home assignment. Throughout the semester the faculty records the performance of each student on each course outcome.

Average attainment in direct method = University Examination (70 %) + Internal assessment (20%) + Assignment (10%)

Indirect assessment strategies are implanted by embedding them in student Exit Survey, Employer Survey and Alumni Survey; few of the Pos are assessed based on relevant developed rubrics. Finally, program outcomes are assessed with above mentioned data and program Assessment Committee concludes the PO attainment level.

Average attainment in indirect method= Average

(Alumni survey + Employer survey + Exit Survey)

The following scoring function is used to calculate the average attainment of each PO.

PO/ PSO Attainment (%) = (weight age: 80%) x (Average attainment in direct method) + (weight age: 20%) x (Average attainment in indirect method)

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities in the neighbourhood community in terms of impact and sensitising students to social issues and holistic development during the last five years

Response:

Mrs. K.S.K. College has organized various extension activities in last five years in the neighborhood community to sensitize students to social issues and their holistic development. **NSS department** adopted the local NGO rehabilitated place, which works for the HIV orphan children named as 'INFANT INDIA'. College has organized seven days special NSS camps in village but from last two year camp was organized at the place of INFANT INDIA. The NSS volunteers completed activities like tree plantation, road repairing, building construction, helping orphan children in the form of food, grains, cloths, etc. NSS girl volunteers have visit every year at the District Jail and they celebrate the 'Raksha Bandhan' program for the prisoners. NSS volunteers always participate in various rallies organizes on social issues.

It is observed that NSS inculcates the feeling of harmony, national integration, unity and togetherness in NSS volunteers, they become self confident, self reliant.

NCC of college has one troop of 54 cadets. The activities of NCC towards social service include blood donation and blood group determination camps, which helps to needy patients in civil hospital. Campaigning in the Beed district city against female feticides, dowry, and violence against women were success fully carried out by NCC cadets. Also NCC cadets were actively participated in various rallies in city organized to create awareness among society ; like anti copy , world literacy day , road safety, cancer awareness, anti drug abuse, voters awareness , anti corruption , yuva jyot , unity run , save girl child, pulse polio , AIDS awareness and Satbhavna rally. Beyond these NCC cadets play a vital role in cleanliness and tree plantation drive which were carried out in neighborhood community. 40 NCC cadets of our college choosed their carrier in the armed force; several NCC cadets joined service of Maharashtra Police department. Mr. Sapkal Umesh attended NCC parade on Mumbai 26January 2016.NCC develops in youth quality and character, courage, commandership, discipline and makes them useful citizens who can serve for country effectively and passionately.

Lifelong learning and extension department has organized farmer counseling and guidance, blood

group determination camp, cleanliness campaign and Jal Saksharta abhiyan in nearby village Pali (Tq.Beed) for farmers.

Every year **Dramatics** department organises special cultural programme 'Aji & Ajoba Cultural Night' for old age people, drama festival for local people, and summer children theater and music workshop for 5-12 year children from neighborhood community. Students from dramatics perform various 'street plays' on burning issues; like farmer suicide, female feticide, AIDs awareness, women empowerment in nearby villages and in public places in Beed city.

Students of **Home Science** department visit regularly to Deaf and Dumb School, Blind School, Remand Home, Old Age Home to give information about hygiene, health and healthy diet. Environmental literacy is created among students by field trips, tours and excursions.

All these extension activities seem to complement the academic curriculum through life experience and use full for sensitizing students to social issues and holistic development of students.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

Response:

We believe the learning environment plays a very important role in the whole education process. Keeping this thought strongly in focus when college was in its planning stages, the institute was built in 1971. It blossomed into an aesthetic combination of lush greenery and modern facilities that are updated as and when change happens. Students live on campus in the very comfortable living facilities created especially for them with their needs in mind. The classrooms are fully furnished and equipped with wifi. Exciting recreational facilities include a gymnasium, grounds equipped for cricket, volleyball, throwball and basketball. The Amphitheatre is a hub of activity and is used extensively to showcase college talent.

IT Facilities:

Recently from this session the institute has made its campus Wi-Fi with 8 Mbps bandwidth. Though the institute has not yet receive any development grant from any agency we make our best efforts to maintain the IT facility of our institute. The institute has internet uses advanced fibre optic cables. Wi-Fi enabled, all areas of the campus enjoy the internet irrespective of where you are – in your hostel or in the academic block, doing research in the library or sitting in the Computer lab, which is equipped with state-of-the-art technology and is available 18 hours six days a week. On Sundays, the Computer Centre is open till 5.30 pm. Students run several of the Intranet sites that provide access to software, music, movies and study aids. These are apart from the sites run by the English and Computer dept. The wi-fi updation first Monday in a every month. Last updation of wi-fi was 01st January 2018.

Nature of Updation:

The College Established in the year 1971, The Institute is 3 acre. The newly constructed blocks have centralised well-furnished classrooms with in-built projector and screen facilities. The infrastructure also includes a state-of-the-art auditorium with a capacity of 500 students. Apart from this, the infrastructure includes student hostels, mess, canteen and coffee stall (which runs 24x7), guest house, and parking area. The Three-floor library with its extensive collection of books on every subject is up to date with the most recent publications of magazines and journals. The entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled to ensure connectivity. Language laboratory

The institute has a well-equipped language laboratory designed to improve the language proficiency of the pupil-teachers. It is a fully computerized laboratory with 18 computers. The software in the computers has provision to listen, to respond, to record, to compare, and to correct. Lab is maintain by Prakash Abhyankar, Goals Mumbai.

Home science laboratory

This laboratory has various charts, models, microwave oven, OHP, Mixture, Laminated Charts, gas stove, utensils, cleaning accessories, spices etc. Pupil-teachers learn to prepare healthy, hygienic and nutritious food in this laboratory. They learn about the various components and the nutritious values of different food items.

The college maintain the maintenance of buildings, classrooms and laboratories.

It has two representatives from teaching staff and one from local society .The meeting of local governing Council takes place twice in a year.

At college level, two – Vice Principal assist the principal the co-ordinator of IQAC ,office superintendent , Supervisor and P.G. Director monitors college activities. All the Heads of the department and Chairman of different committees further assist it.

The student council is formed on merit basis. It suggests relevant improvement the institutional system and process.

Case Study- Admission Process

On the opening day, college organize meeting of faculty for the admission process under the guidance of

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principal. Business of the meeting is to publish the advertisement and formation of various admission committees, Such as B.Sc., B.Com. B.A. and various post graduate departments for smooth conduction of admission process. For each committee one faculty is appointed as a chairman and four to seven member of faculty as per need assisted to chairman. First college publishes advertisement in local as well as regional daily news papers. At PG level admission is preferred under the guidelines of university. As per guidelines university conducts CET examination for centralization of admission process. Allotment of candidates by university as per merit and preferential basis.

In admission process for UG classes admission is preferred on the first come first basis, registration process run under the guidance of vice principal and admission of the candidate those who have been permitted by the principal. The various committees play an important role in the registration, correction and completion of admission form. After the completion of admission form, Chairman allows the candidates for submission of fees and admission form to the office. The clerk of office completes the admission and furnishes fees receipt and admission receipt. Identity card of admitted candidates are prepared and issued through library clerk.

NSSR's Mrs.K.S.K. College has well defined quality policy and action plans. The top management of NSSR's, local governing council, Principal and faculty play a vital role in the design and implementation in quality plans and policy.

The winners are awarded by the chief guest in the valedictory function. Funfair committee arrange minimum 15 funs, department of music organize one musical session it contains Marathi, Hindi songs, lokgeet, and folk culture. Similarly department of dramastics arrange group dance, solo dance, and department of Marathi, Hindi, English, Urdu present play. Before valedictory function college arranges lunch for all students and staff every year. Lastly, in valedictory function the winners of all events and games are awarded by the chief guest.

1. Solid Waste Management:

Wet Waste especially from kitchen & girls hostel such as vegetable refuses, food scraps etc. are collected & Transported to Municipal Corporation Beed for composting.

Basic principles of Dry Waste Management are 4Rs: Refuse, Reduce, Reuse & Recycle:

Refuse: Do not buy anything which we do not really need.

Reduce - Reduce the amount of garbage generated. Alter our lifestyle so that minimum garbage is generated.

Reuse - Reuse everything to its maximum after properly cleaning it. Make secondary use of

different articles.

Recycle – Keep things which can be recycled to be given to rag pickers or waste pickers for recycling.

Segregation at source: Store biodegradable and non biodegradable solid waste in different bins. Recycle of all the components with minimum labor and cost. 3) Different treatments for different types of solid wastes: One must apply the techniques which are suitable to the given type of waste. 4) Treatment at nearest possible point: The solid waste should be treated in as decentralized manner as possible. The waste generated should be treated preferably at the site of generation. Dry waste must undergo shifting for picking out the recyclable to be passed on to the recyclers. The residual reject are sent for incineration in & eco friendly in incinerator.

1. Liquid waste Method:

Liquid waste is appropriately treated for minimizing its toxicity before being discharged into the sewer systems or dumped into land pit or burn it. Liquid waste is treated with chemical disinfectants, neutralized with appropriate reagents then flushed into the sewage system. Thus, liquid waste management includes procedures and practices that prevent discharge of untreated pollutants to the drainage system or to water bodies as a result of the creation, collection, and disposal of non-hazardous liquid wastes.

1. E-waste Management:

Designate a room in the Campus which may be called 'Material Recovery Centre' (MRC). The discarded e-wastes from all the office blocks in the campus shall be sent to the MRC, and stored there until it is sent to e-waste recyclers. Electronic-waste from office can be discarded in two ways. One way is Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR). Under EPR manufacturers of computers, and other electronic items should take back end-of-life products. If some Producers / manufacturers want to appoint a 'Producer Responsibility Organisation', which - on behalf of manufacturers - collect, dismantle and recycle end-of-life products can do so. Institution is used such facility for the disposal of e-waste. The idea is demanding the producers to take back e-waste through the same channel they used for placing a products in customers hands. This can be something like an exchange offer. It is estimated that 75% of electronic items are stored due to uncertainty of how to manage it. These electronic junks lie unattended in houses, offices, warehouses etc. and normally mixed with household wastes, which are finally disposed off at landfills. This necessitates implementable management measures.

7.1.6 Rain water harvesting structures and utilization in the campus

Response:

College has installed three rooftop rain water harvesting systems in college campus.

Catchment area: The catchment of water harvesting system is rooftop that receives rainfall directly and drains the water into transport system. The existing roof is made use of to collect rainwater. Therefore rooftop is swept and cleaned regularly for collecting water to its maximum purity. Total rooftop catchment area is **12391** Square feet.

Transportation system: For transporting rain water from catchment area in this project we have used PVC pipes and fittings. For collection purpose, we are using pipes ranging 2.5 - 3 inches in diameter. In case of system-1, filtered water is then allowed to flow into bore well near boy's parking slot. In case of system-2, filtered water is transferred into bore well in staff parking slot and in case of system-3 rain water from girl's hostel rooftop is transferred into specifically designed dug well near bore well of girls hostel.

The average monsoon rainfall in the area is approximately 666 mm per year. From average rainfall and the

total surface of rooftop catchment area for each system, the amount of water percolated under the ground per year is **7.40 lakh liters** approximately.

Best Practice - 1

1. Title: Language Laboratory for the Students.

2. Objective

English has become the language of globe. In this era of modernization, each and every student should be able to communicate in English as it widely opens the opportunities throughout the world. The students of our college belong to rural area where English is neglected and they are not able to express themselves in English. Considering all these factors, the Institution has established a well equipped language laboratory to acquire all the four language skills viz. listening, reading, writing and speaking. The laboratory helps the students to assess their own capacity of fluency and enable then to become a fluent speaker of English language.

In teaching learning process, ICT plays a very important role. It creates the interest among the learners. Student get attracted towards the laboratory as it has the virtual display of videos, grammar lessons, and other necessary language learning items. The principal objective of language laboratory is to enable the students to be fluent speakers of English language and make them confident and self reliant in English communication.

3. The Context

English language laboratory is the prime requirement of the institution. A well-equipped language laboratory needs a huge finance as it comprises a basic infrastructure, computers, head-phones, software and many more things. The institution overcome all these issues and gave the preference to this practice.

The first challenging issue was of the expenditure for the set up. However, by deducting other college expenses, the institution managed to set up the laboratory. The laboratory has 17 computers with head-phones and the language software.

The second challenging issue was of the student's compatibility. Student are made computer friendly. It was timely appealed to the students to use the language laboratory daily in their free time as it seemed interesting, students are coming regularly now.

4. The Practice

English plays a vital role in higher education in India. Importance of English in India is developing day by day. Now, Indian English has become its own brand on International level. It opens the wide job opportunities across the world. In this era of globalization we cannot think without English as it is a connectivity link, library language, language of technology.

The place of English in India has got prime importance. But, teaching learning of English has its own

problems. Lack of competent teachers, overcrowded class rooms and no English atmosphere around the learners make it difficult to acquire the four language learning skills viz.

Listening-Reading –writing and speaking .In this regard, new innovations and devices are made which role among the learners. Of course, to acquire foreign language is a quiet difficult task for the learners. English is thought by following various method and approaches. Audio-visual aids in teaching - learning has its unique features.

Language laboratory creates interests among the learners. Our language lab has 17 computers with updated software which consists of four level of learning Beginner. Intermediate level, Advance level. The students can open their account with the password and access to the course. There are certain audio and videos to be listened and the exercises to be solved. Even grammar and vocabulary explanations are available. Student's log in account can be accessed and assessed by the tutor (teacher). Student finds it easy to operate and spend their time in this useful activity. The software also records the pronunciations and answer given to the questions. It improves student's pronunciation. So, this is one of the unique and useful activities of the department.

Seventeen computers are connected with LAN and each computer has a separate head phone. So, the students can carry on his learning activity without disturbing the co-learning. Students use the language laboratory in their free time. The record of their attendance is kept in register as well as their accounts are displayed on the monitor. The facility to record their exercise is available in the software.

The students are from rural background and they are not aware of computer. It is a small hindrance to run this activity. First of all we instruct the new laboratory users how to use and handle the computers. The working of software and the courses are informed to the new students. There are some challenges in running this activity but, it is necessary for the overall development of the student. It improves their knowledge and communication in English.

5. Evidence of Success

The demand of linguistic skills is increasing given that learning requirement and command of language are vital in higher education. The student take part in various co-curricular activities such as wall paper presentations, speech competition etc. though the language lab students are able to communicate themselves in various activity. Student participate in speech competition, class seminars etc. Learning a new language just by studying the theory is not enough to guarantee a successful language learning experience. Language lab provides practice in an entertaining and interactive way to acquire the main language skills, listening, speaking reading & writing, students learn more comprehensively through a language lab. Student learns much faster than in a regular class room setting. The language lab boosts the motivation of student's achieving higher levels of language retention and progress. Language lab allows students to practice the language with a much wider variety activities and exercise, based on the computer.

There are many social aspects to learning a language and there are certain aspects which can be extremely helpful to study with other people. Language students often use language lab to do independent work such as listening and re-listening to audio recording testing themselves on grammar rules and practicing vocabulary this enable them to make conversational opportunities. Language lab works by providing language learners with software that allows them to do educational tasks such as listen to audiorecovery test their vocabulary and learn grammar rules. Traditionally each student is motivated by language lab and is controlled by the tutor. The students are motivated to speak with English speech sounds word accent intonation. We try to improve the fluency in spoken English and neutralize mother tongue influence. We train students to the language appropriately for public speaking and interaction.

6. Problem Encountered and Resources required

Mostly our students hail from rural areas so they are not aware of modern means of interaction as so we have to take efforts to compete them to know the importance of language lab as the student are weak in grammar so more efforts are taken to motivate them special attention is given to students who are studying grammar and vocabulary various resources like audio video learner is silent who can recognize English language but can't speak learning vocabulary is limited up to 500 words in passive vocabulary. The problems encountered is that they are unable to speak fluently more practice session are to be taken. The students are aware of the fact one is learning language. Various problems are faced during language lab training such as promounication, accent, tone for that we try our level best to work hard and give more attention to them so as they are able to cope up with these problems. We give them lessons to recite and pronounce so that they can promounce properly. The magical concept for any new English learner is system of silent letters like is silent in 'know' and L is silent is 'walk' and Talk it is difficult for many new learner to understand that both writing and speaking patterns are different in English. Many students face the problem with syllable structure and feel confused in stressed and unstressed sounds. In all we try our level best to improve the reading speaking ability of the students through the means of language lab.

Best Practice – 2

1. Title of Practice: Student Mentoring System

2. Objectives of the Practice

Objectives of the practice are as follows-

- To demonstrates an understanding of campus resources and proactively seek support in resolving their academic problems.
- To engages the students in teaching learning process through mentoring.
- To connects students with faculty as mentors and advisors.
- To improves the interaction between teachers and students on the campus through mentoring system.
- To Creates a better environment in college, where students can approach teachers for both educational and personal guidance.
- To enhance knowledge base for both teachers and students alike, due to effective two-way communication.

3. The Context

Mentoring has been formed in the year 2016-17. Students come from higher secondary school to College, where Class teacher is not there, only scheduled time table for teaching is followed. Somehow, student-teacher communication was lacking. Student mentoring system was thought of as a good solution. It is to have attention of caring adult in College campus. It is to help students to guide for future opportunities. This support system is to help them to set future goals and newer options in a more realistic way. It is to

aware student about his/her potential. It is for the progress of students in today's world of competition. Traditional joint family support is missing in most of the families so to assist adolescents in shaping their future, the system is supposed to work. Therefore the college has decided to entertain the hopes and aspirations of students irrespective of caste, sex, religion and financial background. Many of our students from rural areas lack proper academic background and financial back-up. Mentoring of students thus, is an essential feature to render equitable service to all our students having varied background.

4. The Practice

The IQAC has taken the initiative to introduce the mentoring system for students. The importance of integrating the mentoring system for enhancing students' performance is a common agenda to be followed by the teaching faculty. With a wide variation in the student population in regard to educational and economic background, the system promises to provide a better understanding of individual students and bring out their highest potential. It also appears to be the most effective method for mitigating cases of those students who are vulnerable to drop-out from studies.

The mentoring system was promptly and effectively put into practice from the academic year 2016-17. Each member of the faculty of Arts, Science and Commerce streams is assigned the mentorship. Each teacher is allotted 45-50 students of their respective faculty and he/she will be mentor for all the three years of mentee's graduation. A format for mentee showing the detailed information of the mentee is designed and allotted to each mentor. Mentor helps his/her mentee in understanding of available resources at the campus. Mentor also guides them in choosing the course subjects for their graduation. Mentor also pinpoints the strengths and weakness of the students and guides them accordingly. Mentees are allowed to meet their mentors regularly as per their requirements. For the overall development of the students constructive suggestions are given frequently.

5. Evidence of Success

It has helped to improve communication skills, social skills.

Students felt connected and shared their difficulties.

For College-

Mentoring system has been highly appreciated by the mentee's parents.

The discipline has been improved in the college campus.

It is step ahead towards student-teacher communication.

It served young students in a more responsible way in College campus

College has indirectly set a role model as a mentor in front of students.

Mentor as a caring adult has to improve communication skills.

Mentors developed insight for student's problems and stress.

Mentor experience the problems of mentees and get closer to students from different socio economic status.

Mentors felt, it is an opportunity to cooperate adolescents to nurture career.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources required

1. Mentees and mentor may find problem of common free time for face to face dialogue. At the starting of academic year, this problem has been sorted out by mentors. Subject wise time-table of mentees was of help to decide meeting time of mentees. It was then matched with mentor time-table.

2. Since mobile phone is a boon of new technology, young generation enjoy it. Mentors use it for mentoring Sharing of cell number and thereby formation of whats app group is followed. But all students are not having mobile phones. Students possessing cell phone were having range problem. Many a times the message is not received by students as the number belongs to elder family members. Sometimes, if it is a personal cell, students do change the company SIM card as per attractive offers and are not reachable.

3. As the mentor is a professor, mentees took more time to open up .Teacher do have knowledge of student psychology during their training programs, it is found to be useful.

4. Concept and ways of mentoring, responsibilities of mentor, enhancing service and reviewing progress etc. were discussed in detail during mentor orientation meeting.

7. Notes (Optional)

Many Arts, Science and Commerce Colleges in the backward region like Beed district find problem of either student admission or attendance. Though such problems are not severe in this institution. It is because these are non professional Colleges. Those students who are attending classes ,they are not attending with scholarly attitude. Thus, College faculty should work in this area, as a good support system for students to develop career environment, entrepreneurial skills and job seeking confidence. Such favorable situation will turn into reality if students are punctual and attentive.
